

Dear Members & Friends of TCC:

Greetings in the name of our Savior, Jesus Christ! No matter what has happened since March, we are blessed to know God's love and abiding Spirit!

While we are still in "wait and see" mode when it comes to some of our events, I can report that for Sunday worship we will be able to go indoors once the weather is either too cold to be outdoors (or too rainy). The Governor recently announced that phase 3 begins October 8th which means 50% capacity indoors for churches. The Sanctuary is marked off for Social Distancing, and please wear a mask. We are going to eliminate as much touching as we can, so the offering plate will be in a stable place (rather than passed through the pews) and there will be a place in the service when you can place your offering in the plate. Please bear with us as we navigate this new set up. We will also continue to use the pre-packaged (sealed) Communion sets for Holy Communion.

Here's an updated version of our frequently asked questions:

When will we be back inside for worship? As soon as the weather is too cold (or too rainy) to be outdoors. Please distance, wear a mask, and limit any shared touching of objects. There is a sanitizing station in the Narthex which contains extra masks, hand sanitizer, and wipes. We will wipe down the Sanctuary after each use. We will not be able to have an indoor coffee hour, but we may be able to offer coffee "to go" outdoors and distance while we chat for a few moments depending on weather, etc.

What is the plan for cleaning the building and keeping it sanitized once we return to indoor gatherings? We have the Bioesque cleaning product which our cleaning company administers. We also will wipe down each room after it is used. We have guidelines posted throughout the building. All individuals/groups that use the building will have to adhere to the guidelines. We will have hand sanitizer and masks available as well.

When we do return to worship indoors, what will it look like? We will space out where we sit (the pews are marked for this), we will wear masks, and we are advised not to sing (due to the force of breath exhaled and potentially spreading germs). We had an indoor Memorial Service on Sept. 14 (for Linda Jones) and everything flowed very smoothly in terms of distancing, etc.

In addition to indoor worship, what about other events that we normally have in Sept-Oct-Nov-etc.? At the recent Church Council meeting, we decided not to have the Christmas Bazaar this year; our October concert/dinner had already been postponed to 2021; and other events such as BINGO are all on hold until we have more information. We do have an outdoor event - Horseshoe Tournament - on Oct. 3 (see enclosed flyer).

What about Sunday school? No decision has been made yet about Sunday school. We will keep you posted. We will continue the online Sunday school videos that we know have been very well received during this pandemic. These videos started Sept. 19th. (If you have missed any, you can always go back and watch them as they will remain on Facebook and YouTube). Confirmation Class began on Sept. 20 and the class has 5 students so we are able to meet in-person (distanced and with masks). We are planning and hoping to have Confirmation Sunday for last year's confirmation class on October 25th.

What can we do (other than worship)? We have our Annual (outdoor) Horseshoe Tournament on Oct. 3 (see enclosed flyer). Other events may arise and be scheduled depending on news and State of CT changes in guidelines. An example may be that we do a to-go meal fundraiser. Another example may be that we schedule more outdoor events.

I am very encouraged that our online videos have received hundreds and - in some cases - thousands of views. The Vacation Bible School videos were especially amazing!

I am also encouraged that many hospitals and some nursing facilities are now allowing visits (in some cases, outdoors only). Please let me know if you or someone you know is in the hospital and would like to receive a visit.

In addition, we continue to reach out to people in need. We just completed our 5th round of care packages (thank you all for your generous donations!) and we are now collecting for our 6th round of packages. We also just received a Thomaston Savings Bank Foundation, Inc. grant so that we can continue providing meals for the residents of Eli Terry Retirement and Gosinski Park for the 2020-2021 year. (We can do the meals take-out or to-go as needed).

Please continue to support our church during these times. You can give online at terryvillecongregationalchurch.org or by mailing (or dropping at the office) your pledge. Our church has and continues to be a bright shining light of God's good news and love during these trying times, and we have to keep it going!

Christine's Story

29 years ago, at 14 years old, I got my first job as a server in a small cafe in my hometown just outside of Chicago. Teaching it made me strive to make it captivating so the important information can actually be retained by each and every participant. I like to think I am doing everything I can to help stop drunk driving before it happens. I feel with every class, the roads become a little bit safer for everyone.


